



Dear District F:



PUBLIC SAFETY

We are responsible for public safety, here is our financial investment committed to improving safety.

- June 22, 2022 – 2nd Annual Public Safety Town Hall at Tracy Gee Community Center
- 50, \$137,00 License Plate Reader (LPR) Cameras throughout District
- \$101,000 paid overtime to Midwest HPD to close dangerous night clubs
- Installed additional streetlights in neighborhoods and dark intersections, \$2500 in fees waived

• GUN BUY BACK / OCT. 8, 2022

The Gun Buyback program was an added effort to help reduce violent crime in Houston as part of Mayor Sylvester Turner's One Safe Houston initiative and in partnership with the Houston Police Department. Depending on the type of weapon, citizens who turned in firearms were rewarded with a gift card valued between \$50.00 to \$200.00, with a no-question-asked policy by law enforcement.

The second City of Houston Gun Buyback event at the Westchase Metro Park and Ride located in District F, saw unprecedented results.

With hundreds of residents, community organizations and elected officials in participation, a total of **1,208 firearms** were turned in (approximately 400 more than the first gun buyback event held this July) it is believed to have surpassed national records of similar events held by other cities in the US.
