DISTRICT F PRIORITIES

Youth Engagement

Investing in our young people creates a healthier and wealthier economy. In District F we have funded after-school programs and developed an intense intern program Alief Votes to encourage civic engagement.

Economic Development

Improving people's living standards through creating jobs, infrastructure, education, and health. Supporting workforce development and access to adult literacy to improve the economic conditions of our residents.

Public Safety

Safety is more than centering police; it includes how well we protect our neighborhoods from natural disasters, removing blight from communities and even installing streetlights to increase visibility.

Neighborhood Revitalization

Many of our neighborhoods are older and require a refresh. We have invested in the reconstruction of new sidewalks, concrete panel replacements, maintain easements, removing debris, blight and illegal dumping from our right of ways and public spaces.

Quality of Life

Advocating for ordinances to improve the experience in your neighborhood is paramount. Supporting and leading on issues and ordinances to limit noise, after-hour clubs and stray animals has made the difference.



DISTRICT F PRIORITIES

PUBLIC SAFETY

In 2023, District F prioritized public safety, strengthening community-police relations, launching targeted crime prevention programs, and investing in advanced technology for swift responses. Collaborative efforts with local organizations addressed root causes of crime, while proactive emergency preparedness measures ensured residents' safety. Ongoing vigilance and community involvement remain essential for sustained progress in creating a safer environment.



3rd Annual Public Safety Town Hall

June 26, 2023 – District F held the 3rd Annual Public Safety Town Hall at the West Houston Institute. Neighbors heard from esteemed panelists such as HPD Chief Troy Finner and HFD Chief Sam Peña. Topics covered included homeless encampments, fire safety and neighborhood nuisances.



Smoke Detector Canvass and Fire Safety Outreach

June 30, 2023 – In partnership with the Houston Fire Department, the District F team along with students from Prairie View A&M University and Alief ISD canvassed the Beckford Place and Carver Crest neighborhoods ahead of July 4th. We passed out information to over 450 homes on proper fire safety measures and provided instructions on how to receive a free smoke detector from the Houston Fire Department.





District F Swim Event

July 16, 2023 – As a part of the Summer of Safety, District F partnered with Houston Waves Swim Club to provide a free water safety clinic for adults and children. The event was held at the newly opened Alief Neighborhood Center swimming pool.



Billboard

August 2023 – Councilmember Thomas teamed up with the Houston Coalition of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and Outdoor Media to lend her voice against gun violence at Hwy 59 and Wilcrest.



National Night Out

October 3, 2023 – Public safety includes meeting your neighbors. The District F team was in full force to meet with six different communities – in the rain to share updates on public safety, infrastructure, city ordinances and more. This year we visited Contemporary Westheimer Townhomes, Tanglewilde, Parkglen, Westpark Village and Ashford Park Section Six.



Harwin/Boone Dump Cleanup

February 8, 2023 – Collaborated with community partners to organize a cleanup initiative, enhancing the public safety and community well-being in District F.





DISTRICT F PRIORITIES

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

District F is home to some of the most vibrant and fastest growing neighborhoods and businesses in the city. Through office-led events, policy and partnerships, Councilmember Thomas fostered this vibrancy and growth throughout the year.

Deed Restriction Workshop

April 29, 2023 - In partnership with Rice & Rice Law Firm, CenterPoint Energy, Avenue 360 and Frost Bank, District F held a Deed Restrictions Workshop to educate neighborhood leaders on updating deed restrictions. The recording of this workshop can be found on the District F website. Local government has a role in supporting residents with the information to protect their assets.

Westchase 380

November 1, 2023 – Houston City Council approved a 10-year extension of the Westchase 380 Agreement. In the next 10 years, Westchase can expect to see even more roadway and drainage projects with an estimated future investment of \$233,964,675. The original agreement approved in 2013 was responsible for many improvements in Westchase including the construction of Woodchase Park and rebuilding of Walnut Bend Lane.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

As an educator and former school board member, Councilmember Thomas understands the importance and necessity of youth engagement. District F continued youth empowerment and sponsored youth-directed programs.

AliefVotes

2023 – Powered by the District F office, AliefVotes program expanded their reach and influence in its second full year of operation. AliefVotes members and fellows held well-attended community events including a Civic Engagement Workshop at the Chinese Community Center and Chromebook Laptop Distribution at the Alief Neighborhood Center. Fellows also assisted at District F's back to school backpack giveaway. Look out for more events coming from these amazing young leaders in the years to come.

Case for Kids Check Presentation

April 6, 2023 – In partnership with the Harris County Department of Education and The Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids (CASE for Kids), Councilmember Thomas presented a total of **\$45,000** in awards to five District F non-profits. Awardees included: Spirit of Youth Fencing Foundation, JJ's I'm Me Foundation, FotoFest, Chinese Community Center and Girlstart.

On July 11, CASE Debate students received a proclamation from Mayor Turner for their successful participation in the Houston Urban Debate League Day.



Reading with a Rapper

February 6, 2023 – Councilmember Thomas gathered Mayor Turner and Houston and Alief ISD superintendents along with Houston-based literacy program, Reading with a Rapper, to announce an investment of \$30,000 for the #TurnTexasYellow campaign. District F schools, HISD’s Piney Point Elementary School and Alief ISD’s Holub Elementary School, are a part of the campaign to increase literacy in under-resourced schools.



Hire Houston Youth (HHY) Interns

June 14, 2023 – District F participated in the Hire Houston Youth program again this summer. Returning interns, Izabella Garcia and Tommy Wan, have proven themselves to be an invaluable resource for the District F team. They aided in the success of many events including the pet pantry, back-to-school backpack giveaway and public safety town hall.



Easter Egg Hunt with Piney Point CC, Pilgrims Rest MBC, HPD Midwest (April 1)


- Hosted a festive Easter Egg Hunt, fostering community engagement and collaboration with local organizations and law enforcement.

DISTRICT F PRIORITIES

NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION

This year, District F welcomed a number of projects aimed at revitalizing our beloved neighborhoods. Taking care of and improving the district's current infrastructure is a key tenet of our office. From revamping our neighborhood parks to decommissioning homeless encampments to restriping crosswalks. These projects are all a part of making sure our neighborhoods are treated with respect.

50/50 Parks in District F

District F celebrated the opening the last 50/50 Parks in our neighborhoods this year: Harwin Park and Tanglewilde Park. The 50/50 Parks Initiative is led by the Office of the Mayor, Houston Parks & Recreation Department, Greater Houston Partnership and the Houston Parks Board. They bring together public and private funds to revitalize neighborhood parks, one park at time.



Harwin Park

February 18, 2023 – Harwin Park was one of the first parks in the city to complete its transformation as a part of the 50/50 Parks Partnership. Some of the improvements include added lighting, new covered picnic pavilion and upgrades to the walkways.

Tanglewilde Park

October 27, 2023 – Councilmember Thomas celebrated with local leaders at the Tanglewilde Park ribbon cutting. Improvements to this 57-year-old park included updated playground equipment, a walking loop, and lighting and drainage—special shoutout to the Tanglewilde and Westmont neighbors who contributed their insight into the planning and development of the park.



Homeless Encampment Tour

September 15, 2023 – Following numerous calls from District F neighbors about concerns in the rising number of homeless people, Councilmember Thomas invited Marc Eichenbaum, Special Assistant to the Mayor on Homeless Initiatives, for a site visit of homeless encampments in District F. District F has worked closely with Marc, Houston Police Department, and Coalition for the Homeless to address the concerns of our housed and unhoused neighbors. The district will see an increase of outreach from nonprofit organizations at the end of 2023.



Houston Tool Bank Emergency Preparedness Partnership

Focused on strategic partnerships and preparedness to identify Neighborhood Emergency Hubs and Preparedness Partnerships to deploy resources before or immediately after an event.



Restriping Crosswalks for Alief ISD

November 2023 – After visiting an Alief ISD school, Councilmember Thomas noticed the deteriorating conditions of the crosswalks. Councilmember Thomas worked with the mayor's office and Houston Public Works to get the sidewalks restriped in a matter of weeks, making it safer for students and drivers.

District F continued enhancing residents' quality of life by prioritizing and sponsoring cultural and educational programs, promoting health and wellness, and investing in infrastructure improvements. These efforts contribute to a vibrant community where residents have recreational opportunities, cultural enrichment, and improved living conditions. The commitment to improving the quality of life is an ongoing journey, fostering a district where every resident can thrive.



Loving Our Seniors Event (February 18)

February 18, 2023 – We hosted the 3rd Annual Loving Our Seniors Event. Along with volunteers and support from SLB, we delivered Valentine's Day baskets to show love to our senior neighbors in Carver Crest.



District F Health Fair

May 20, 2023 – With the Houston Health Department, District F hosted a health fair at the Alief Neighborhood Center. Hundreds of our neighbors had an opportunity to speak with healthcare professionals and receive wellness exams.



HOT Spot Team

The City Council District F Hot Spot Team, a vital force in combating illegal dumping and enhancing community well-being, has completed **445 work orders, investing 1,209 man-hours**. Their comprehensive efforts include removing 16,050 lbs. of tree waste, 88 mattresses, 396 pieces of furniture waste, 348 tires, 14,040 lbs. of trash debris, 95 shopping carts, and 3,631 bandit signs. Additionally, the team has taken swift action and contributed to landscaping 25,000 sq feet, fostering an overall improvement in neighborhood quality and safety.

May 30, 2023 – With Councilmember Thomas's suggestion, Mayor Turner created the Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Advisory Board – a first. Many District F AAPI leaders, including Kenneth Li and Ben Chou, are distinguished members of the board representing every Asian expression in the city.

March 29, 2023 — Advocated for protecting the historical community of Piney Point by helping community leaders in their initiative to be recognized as a Conservation District.

Dias De los Muertos Festival at Sam Houston Park

October 28, 2023 — Participated in the Dias De los Muertos Festival celebration, embracing and preserving cultural traditions.



Blake's BBQ Closing

June 30, 2023 — Historic Piney Point and Houston institution, Blake's BBQ closed its doors this summer. We were honored to celebrate the last day with Mr. Blake, HFD Station 60 firefighters and our neighbors.



Africa Trade Trip with Mayor's Office of Economic Development

July 16-24, 2023 — District F has the largest Nigerian American population in the United States.

Councilmember Thomas joined Mayor Sylvester Turner and the Houston Delegation for a three-country trade mission to West Africa to foster economic ties related to Port Houston, Houston Airport System and Texas Medical Center. The group visited Nigeria, Cote d'Ivoire, and Ghana.

Councilmember Thomas received a surprise Happy Birthday serenade from His Excellency Adamu Gwari, the Permanent Secretary of FCTA in Nigeria and the Honorable Abike Daibiri Erewa.

In addition to Councilmember Thomas, the delegation included Vice Mayor Pro-Tem Martha Castex Tatum and City Council Member Karla Cisneros along with members from various sectors and industries including the Texas Medical Center, Chevron, Haliburton, Port Houston, East End Maker Hub, and the Ghana-Houston Chamber of Commerce.

The mission of the trip was to foster government and business relationships between the City of Houston and the three West African countries, build on existing relationships, explore new bi-lateral economic opportunities, and strengthen cultural and civic engagement.

ALIEF NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER

Alief Neighborhood Center Opening (January 15)

January 15, 2023 – Elected officials and community leaders came out to celebrate the long-awaited opening of the Alief Neighborhood Center.

Over 2,200 Houstonians descended upon the new state of the art 70,000 square foot Alief Neighborhood Center. The new neighborhood center is erected on the same grounds of the old Alief Community Center affectionally known as the Quillian Center.

The 38 acre renovated park at the community center features a public pool, playground, skatepark, baseball diamond, soccer fields, walking paths, tennis and basketball courts.



Houston Parks & Recreation

The new park development has an event lawn and game area, swimming pool, walking paths, tennis/pickleball courts, basketball court, skatepark, soccer fields, practice field and futsal courts.

Enjoy swim lessons, water aerobics, open swim, and lap swimming and many other classes. The center offers youth focused amenities include a playground with a large climbing net structure and climbing wall, parents can also unwind in natural spaces or consider the FREE youth after-school and summer enrichment and meal programs.



Houston Public Library

Housed on the second floor, the Alief Regional Library also offers access to TECHLink, an innovative and potentially transformative extension of HPL's current program of services that includes free and equitable access to new and emerging state-of-the-art technologies.

These spaces provide the community with instruction and tools for exploring music and video production, digital animation, graphic design, photo editing, multimedia presentations, coding, and science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM)-focused education.



Houston Health Department

Inside the facility, there is a full-service health department that performs many enhanced functions to address health inequities. Services benefit all Houston residents, but we also take additional steps to support those most in need, such as low-income mothers and children, the elderly, and minority populations.

The Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) clinic provides nutritional education & health care referrals, the Diabetes Awareness and Wellness Network (DAWN), provides free diabetes self-management education, and Baker Ripley Senior Health and Wellness Center offers free meals, exercise classes, arts & crafts, and senior resources.

What Do Houston City Council Members Actually Do? An Interview with Tiffany Thomas, District F



Houston city council elections are coming up on November 7, but they aren't getting nearly as much press as the mayoral race. That's not surprising, but council members are empowered to make important decisions too. It's worth learning what the job entails.

After experiencing part of a day in the life of a council member, reporter Eave Conway sat down with Council Member Tiffany D. Thomas to question her about her job. Thomas represents District F, including Alief and the Chinatown section of Sharpstown. Thomas is also a professor of Community Development at Prairie View A&M.

Q: How do you balance your day, especially since this is only your part-time job?

A: I don't think there's a such thing as balance. It's just how you make it harmonious... which means you can't make everything, which means you have to prioritize...

My core obligation is to constituents first, so I make decisions based on that. As council members, we are often invited to all types of stuff... If I have competing interests, I'm going to default to constituents. That may mean going to an IGA that has ten people there and declining the gala, declining the big luncheon with the speaker because at the end of the day I live in that neighborhood, and I want to make sure that if I can respond to their need—which may be "Why is solid waste delayed?" Can we get our sidewalk fixed?"—to me, that's the letter we of my time...

Every week on Sundays, I do what I [my staff] my priorities of the work. There may be something that has happened in the news cycle that has... shifted our direction.



Despite discouragement from her high school guidance counselor, she became the second Black female graduate from the University of Houston's College of Architecture and the third licensed architect in Houston. Renetta's career included notable projects at one of the world's largest developers, Hines, such as space planning for First Colony Mall and Galleria area office buildings. Discovered by Commissioner El Franco Lee while designing the Harris County Children's Protective Services Center, she spent over 17 years with the Harris County Engineering Department.

In an effort to halt further auto-related businesses from ruining the neighborhood, Renetta volunteered to serve as chair of the Piney Point Conservation District Committee. She is joined on that committee by fellow Piney Point advocates, Carolyn Boozer, Janie Putney and Patrick Goffney. The committee aims to preserve the existing fabric and character of the Historic Piney Point neighborhood for future generations.

HOUSING & COMMUNITY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Councilmember Thomas chairs the Housing & Community Affairs Committee (HCA) and oversees the authorization of over **\$90 million** in federal, state and local funds to be utilized for numerous projects including job training, rapid rehousing, and single- and multi-family housing developments across the city. Council Member David Robinson serves as vice chair.

Below are highlights from each month's committee hearing.

January 17, 2023

The first meeting of the year included HCD's recommendation for Council approval of a substantial amendment to the Affordable Homes Fund Budget for the New Home Development Program (NHDP), amendments to agreements between COH and NGOs, and an additional **\$500,000** in Hurricane Harvey Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR17) funds for a new multifamily development.

February 2023

Two meetings were conducted in February. The first meeting was a Special Called Meeting to review 9% Housing Tax Credit (HTC) applicants and recommendations. The second meeting consisted of ordinance recommendations for Public Services, Public Facilities and Single-Family developments.

March 2023

This meeting recommended Council approval to submit a grant application to HUD to receive over **\$52 million** in federal entitlement funds. HCD also recommended approval of over \$40 million for numerous projects in the Large Tract Affordable Home Development Program (AHDP) and **\$1.6 million** in Public Services.

April 2023

April's meeting recommended Council approval

to submit a **\$50 million** HUD grant application for CDBG-Disaster Recovery 2021 funds. HCD recommended approval of over **\$7.5 million** in HOPWA funds, **\$4.5 million** in Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME) funds and a 4% HTC resolution for a multifamily development.

May 2023

May's meeting included recommendations for Council, including **\$350,000** in Public Services, **\$7.75 million** for Public Facilities, **\$5.95 million** for Single Family developments and an amendment for the CDBG-DR17 program.

June 2023

This meeting included recommendations for Council approval of over \$850,000 in Public Services, **\$7.4 million** for Single-Family developments and a new Public Facilities lease agreement.

July

No meeting was held in July

August 2023

In August, HCD recommended Council approval for an amendment to the 2023 Annual Action Plan, **\$2 million** in Public Services, and a revision to the Harvey Homebuyer Assistance Program.

September 2023

September's meeting consisted of recommendations for Council approval of **\$650,000** in Public Services, **\$14.3 million** in Single Family development and over **\$1.3 million** in Multifamily development. HCD also recommended approval of ordinances between COH and Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) to accept over **\$1.4 million** of 224 Texas Homeless Housing Services Program funds.

October 2023

Discussed recommendations to amend CDBG-DR17 subrecipient agreement with the Texas General Land Office (GLO) and submission of applications to U.S. Department of Labor and HUD to receive over **\$3 million** in grant funding. This month also saw a recommendation to provide almost **\$275,000** to District F's West Houston Assistance Ministries (WHAM) for rapid rehousing and housing navigation services.

District F reported 515 water leaks in August and 364 in September for a total of 879.

High water bills – Related to the water leaks, but also an issue throughout the year. Electronic water meters and the implementation of estimated usage caused many neighbors to receive erroneously high water bills.

Homeless encampments – The city of Houston is a national leader in combatting homelessness, however, as many of our neighbors reported to the office, District F has seen an increase in homelessness. CM Thomas along with the Mayor’s Special Advisor on Homeless Initiatives, Marc Eichenbaum, toured some of the most reported homeless encampments in F. The city is slated to focus on District F in the fall and winter of 2023 to provide resources to our unhoused neighbors and to clean up our neighborhoods.

Streetlights – Streetlights were such a hot topic this year that we created a form for our residents to submit their requests for new streetlights and streetlight repairs. We were able to route requests directly to our CenterPoint partners who worked hard to make our streets safer. Council passed an ordinance to make it take away the fees for residents to request new streetlights.
